

The Challenge

Vocational equity and a broken food system contribute to Beaver County's high-poverty populations and economic barriers to food.

Food is universal; food knows no race, religion, class, or ethnicity. All of us need it, and great food has the remarkable ability to bring people together. For that reason, food is also communal. Many relationships begin with a meal and, even in times of conflict, food is often central to bringing us back together.

And finally, food is an indicator of our overall well-being. There are direct links between our food, our health, the health of our communities, and the health of the earth. Research shows that communities with a stable food system are typically vibrant, healthy, & economically secure communities. So, where there is food, there is opportunity!





Our Impact

Crop & Kettle provides the comprehensive training needed to better serve community employment needs.

Combining the agricultural and industrial influences that are present within the region, students in our programs receive a complete farm to fork experience as they engage in a unique culinary curriculum that impacts both technical training and valuable life skills.

At Crop & Kettle, our culinary training begins by first experiencing where the food comes from. Students begin the program on a farm where they learn the basics of planting, cultivating, and harvesting their own herbs and vegetables in addition to caring for livestock and poutlry. Seeing food develop from a seed in the ground, students later enter the kitchen with an enhanced appreciation for the value of the food while similarly discovering where their own value might align in the process.



C&K's Executive Director is an engineering graduate of the University of Pittsburgh born and raised on a farm in Butler County, PA with extensive experience in project management, systems organization, and additional training and certifications in entrepreneurial leadership (CCAC), Bridges Out of Poverty, and ServSafe Management.

Expansion of facilities and staffing will allow for more students to participate in the program.


...expand food system engagement throughout the region.
